# ARCHBISHOP'S TOURNAMENT 2003

NEW YORK—Another weekend of world-class athletic competition is complete. A new champion has been named. After a day of exciting matchups, the 2003 Sports Weekend champion Holy Martyrs team (Bayside, NY) beat out defending Archbishop's Tournament champion St. Vartan Cathedral (New York, NY) by one point, taking home the first place trophy. Council chairman Dn. Diran Jebejian. "With the support of our local ACYOA chapters, we can eventually host weekends with 12-14 teams participating in fellowship and athletic competition." The weekend came to a close on Sunday, October 12, with Divine Liturgy at St. Vartan Cathedral.

#### WYNNEWOOD, PA—St. Sahag & St. Mesrob Church

# SEVEN QUESTIONS: AN INTERVIEW WITH FR. GARABED KOCHAKIAN

The following is a short interview with Fr. Garabed Kochakian, pastor of St. John's Armenian Church in Southfield, MI conducted by one of his parishioners and ACYOA Central Council Treasurer, Jennifer Morris. At this year's ACYOA General Assembly, Fr. Garabed was recognized for his nurturing and positive leadership of youth by becoming the first recipient of the Fr. Haigazoun Melkonian Award, created in honor and memory of the late priest. The introduction below is written by Jennifer.

As my pastor, cousin and friend, Fr. Garabed has been someone whom I have turned to for guidance and support for many years. However, it was not until a recent conversation over dinner that I learned about the man behind the collar.

Fr. Garabed grew up in Massachusetts where it was apparent at a very early age that he was dedicated to the Church. He served as organist, choir member and altar server in his local parish and was an active member of the ACYDA as a youth. He also developed a passion and deep love for art. After high school, he attended Vesper George School of Art and the Boston Museum of Fine Arts School of Art, both in Boston to pursue his passion. But after completing his second year of art school, he made a major change in his career path: at 21, he decided he wanted to become a priest and entered St. Nersess Armenian Seminary and St. Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary in Crestwood. NY.

In the summer of 1970, he traveled to Armenia to study language and church history at Etchmiadzin and it was there that he met his future yeretzgin (my cousin), Roberta Carman of Detroit, MI, who was there on an ASP trip. Later, he also studied at the Melkonian Educational Institute in Nicosia, Cyprus and the Armenian Patriarchate of St. James in Jerusalem. He has led parishes in Worcester, MA, where he was first Deacon-in-Charge and then pastor, and in Racine, WI where he served for ten years at St. Mesrob Church. He was appointed Chancellor of the Diocese by the Primate, and for six years worked with Diocesan staff, parish clergy and lay leaders. He returned in 1998 to St. John's Church (where 22 years earlier he had gotten married) to serve as our pastor. Fr. Garabed's leadership at St. John's has been an inspiration for parishioners of all ages, but especially for the youth.

# What are three words or phrases you would use to describe yourself?

Let me think about that one. I'd have to say disciplined, wanting to love and finicky because of my type A personality.

## What do you feel is your greatest strength?

I believe my greatest strengths are teaching and preaching.

# What do you hope each parishioner leaves church with each Sunday?

I hope they leave church smiling, with a happy heart, and a desire to return because it is the beauty of worship that holds us together.

#### What is your greatest concern as a pastor?

I'd like to find someone to replace me when I'm gone. I hope to do that by personally developing and cultivating a one-on-one relationship with a future seminarian.

#### What is your greatest frustration?

It's the lack of time I have to spend with youth. I'm so busy with my regular parish duties that I just can't be with them as much as I'd like. I truly believe that there's no future in the life of the church unless a pastor spends time with his youth.

#### What is one of your greatest accomplishments?

Fr. Stepanos (Doudoukjian) is one of my great success stories. I felt that through our relationship while he was struggling about his future and we had many conversations, he was able to develop the courage to do what he was called by God to do. And today, he is one of our finest priests. (In one particular letter, Fr. Garabed wrote, "The Lord surely presents the work to us all, it's up to us to be self-motivated and perform His work. If you are a procrastinator by nature, then you'll never get anything done or achieve anything—even the salvation of your soul: but if you are a worker and do, you till be able to perform greater works for the Glory of God."]

#### And finally, Der Hayr, what's your favorite Bible passage?

John 3:16

## A CONFESSION OF FAITH FOR ALL TIMES

"You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." (Matthew 16:16)



When Jesus asked his disciples about who people say is the Son of God, they replied that some say John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others, Jeremiah or one of the other prophets. But when he asked them, "What about you? Who do you say I am?", the disciples are put on the spot. Perhaps Jesus was challenging them. Maybe he was testing their faith. Or perhaps he wanted to hear from his disciples--his closest followers and friends--what they thought, what they believed. Their Lord and Master asked them a direct and personal question. It touched upon their faith, knowledge, experience, cultural heritage, and religious tradition. "Who is this Jesus?" they may have asked themselves.

The synoptic gospels tell us that Simon Peter spoke up and bailed out the group by making the greatest confession of faith of all time: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God."


His reply, his confession, is very clear. Simon tells Jesus that he is not just another of the prophets, but rather the Messiah, the Christ. Upon hearing this confession of faith, Jesus immediately blessed Simon and said, "For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven."

In an age when "seeing is believing" (re: the nightly news), the challenges to our faith are many, if not constant. We're shown both the beauty of a sunset and the result of terrorist acts, and seem to place God in both. We praise God for the beautiful sunset, and we either blame him for "man's inhumanity to man," or question how he could allow it to occur.

When Simon spoke, he was speaking to the Lord, he was with the Lord; he walked and talked with the Lord daily. Yet, Jesus blessed him, not because he gave the correct answer, not because of any human revelation via flesh and blood, but because to understand spiritual realities involves God's beneficence to disclose such. And the prerequisite for such disclosure is faith.

When Jesus asks us, "who do you say I am," will our faith allow us to echo Simon Peter?

Last month, on October 11th, the Armenian Church commemorated the feast of the Holy Translators, among whom of course is St. Mesrob Mashdots. Below is a brief bio. Take it to your next meeting, and share with the group as an educational session.

St. Mesrob Mashdots was born in Western Armenia. He had been prominent in the court but gave up life as a nobleman-soldier to become a monk (*vartabed*). The Catholicos Sahag assigned to him the job of inventing the Armenian alphabet. Mashdots was sent to the center of Christian learning, Edessa, and then to Samosad, where he worked with the help of a calligrapher to form the 36 letters. (Mashdots is also responsible for the alphabets used by the Georgians and the Caucasian Albanians.)

With Sahag, he founded the first schools to teach the language. Much of his own writing, the letters and speeches, have been lost. All that remain are descriptions of them in the biography written by his student Goriun. But his church hymns have survived as well as some poetry.
